Ron's Ramblings

I remember when we at the historical society took the summers off. Where did that idea go? We have grown so much in recent years that we don't have that luxury anymore.

We began our summer with a work day on May 30, when Ron Feulner, Joel Reed, Harold Jones, Skip Ballou, Louise Okoniewski, Nancy Homiak, Janet Jones, Katie Finnegan, and Dick Rowland showed up at the IOOF Hall armed with axes, shovels, wheel barrows, and rakes to do some serious lawn making. By the time we left, the rocks were gone, the soil leveled and seeded, and hay was spread on top. A few weeks later what had been a stone pile, looked like a manicured lawn. Sabrina Carter and her friend kept the lawns at both the IOOF Hall and the Daketown School looking great all summer. They mowed both lawns with walk behind mowers, and this summer with the record rainfall that we had, the grass grew unusually fast.

The really big activity this summer has been the farmer's market. It has grown beyond any of our imaginations. Our decision to move the market to the Town Park in Middle Grove was a good one. The parking problems simply evaporated, and we now have the potential for even more growth. Almost every week this summer, we had new vendors requesting permission to join us while the old standbys seemed to still be doing a brisk business. Consumers could find a wide variety of fresh vegetables, meats, and baked goods or simply sit and rest for a while and have a great snack in the Greenfield Kid's Café. Everyone, including the vendors, enjoyed the music provided by either our own Jim Smith and his guitar, or the sweet sounds of Acoustic Chocolate, the three-piece band made up of three Corinth teachers who volunteered their time and talents. Acoustic Chocolate is the name that Richard Whitaker, Brian Bishop, and Richard Starace have given to their smaller three-piece version of their band. The five-piece band is known as CTB (or the Corinth Teachers *Band*). When not playing for free at our farmer's market, they are available for parties and special occasions. Our historical society had a tent at the market during each of the 10 market days. Volunteers from the historical society who handed out free brochures and signed up new members shared the tent. The following volunteers participated: Skip Ballou, Dan Chertoc, Katie and Pat Finnegan, Holly Charlton, Alice Feulner, Matt and Maureen Cinadr, Earl and Margie Jones, Janet Jones, Nancy Homiak, Joan and Dick Rowland, Patty Schwartzbeck, Harold and Annette Jones, and Lynn Wochinger. We also had local authors who took turns in the tent all summer. Those participating were Joe Bruchac, Mary Sanders Shartle, Bruce Hiscock, Ron Feulner, Mary Cuffe Perez, and Jennifer Sattler.

In addition to the above volunteers, Ann Michel and Joyce Woodard opened the IOOF Hall every Thursday afternoon and one Friday afternoon per month coinciding with the times when the market was occurring. They split their time sorting and displaying our archive collection and welcoming visitors to the historic building. Skip Ballou often dropped in and managed to obtain a quality computer and set it up for us. In between times, he hung photographs on the walls and made some repairs to the shutters on the outside of the building.

The volunteer that really made the market happen this summer is our trustee, Ron Deutsch. When Ron joined our organization a few years ago, he said that he would like to get involved. When we began talking about sponsoring a farmer's market, I remembered Ron's interest and asked him if he would like to be chairperson. He accepted, and I have been thanking my lucky stars ever since. Not only has he tirelessly trucked tents, tables and chairs on a weekly basis, but he has also helped to organize the successful Greenfield Kid's Café and music programs. I have learned a lot about diplomacy by watching Ron in action. Keeping the peace between 25 venders (many of whom have strong and sometimes diverging opinions about how a farmer's market should be run) is no easy task. I know that he had helpers like Kathy Starace who took over when Ron was on vacation and Dan Chertok who seemed to pop up everywhere he was needed, but Ron, I think, was the primary glue that kept everything together and running smoothly. Ron is not the type of person who seeks recognition, and he is probably squirming in his chair as he reads this, but I felt that I had to give him credit for what he has accomplished. I should also mention his son, Ronnie, who grilled some of the best hot dogs I have ever tasted and helped to make the Kid's Café the success that it was. Of course, there were so many volunteers involved in making this year's market a success that I cannot name them all, but that does not mean that we don't appreciate their efforts. I would be remiss if I didn't say thank you to all the vendors who arrived rain or shine to set up their tents and then cleaned up the space afterwards. Without them the market could not have existed. And finally, thanks to the Town Board for allowing us to use the Middle Grove Town Park every Friday afternoon for the market place.

On Aug. 18 we held a board meeting at the Town Hall. Attending were Ron Feulner, Alice Feulner, Louise Okoniewski, Patty Schwartzbeck, Robert Roeckle, Ron Deutsch, JoAnn Rowland, Coral Crosman, and committee

chairpersons Joyce Woodard, Ann Michel, and Harold Jones. The first item of business to be decided was to have an Open House and Harvest Party on Saturday, Oct. 24 from 1 to 4 p.m. this fall at the IOOF Hall instead of our regular October meeting. Some of the farmer's market vendors will be there with their fall harvest along with a historical society tent with grilled food. The second item was to decide to have our December Christmas Party at the Community Center in Greenfield instead of at the IOOF Hall this year. In recent years, we have had heavy snows and cold temperatures to deal with at the IOOF Hall, and we decided it would be a lot easier and warmer at the Community Center. The last item of business dealt with a letter from our insurance company asking us to make repairs on our IOOF property or risk losing our insurance coverage. They wanted the carriage barn siding repaired and secured so that unauthorized persons could not gain entry, and they also wanted the slate roof over the side door of the IOOF Hall repaired. The board accepted a bid from the same company that did the roof work on the carriage barn last year. They had the lower of two bids received. The work will be completed this fall.

On Sept. 13 (from 1 to 4 p.m.), the historical society will have a tent and hand out information about our organization to the public at the *Meet the Creek* activities scheduled at the Town Park in Porter Corners (behind the town garage and firehouse in Porters). *Meet the Creek* is sponsored by the *Friends of the Kayaderosseras Creek* which is a volunteer organization dedicated to protecting the creek and promoting its history. Patty Schwartzbeck, Ann Michel, and Joyce Woodard will be volunteers present representing our society. Ron Deutsch has agreed to bring the table and tent and help set it up. At 2 p.m. and again at 3 p.m., our own Don Young will give talk about the history of Mill Creek. Please stop in and say hello.

And finally a reminder that our September meeting will be preceded at 6 p.m. by a *Bring a Dish to Pass Dinner*. All members and guests are welcome. The business meeting will begin at 7 p.m. Following the meeting, we will have a program (see listing on front page). I hope to see you all there.

Letter to the Editor:

In response to *Flames of History* by Louise Okoniewski which appeared in the May 09 newsletter. Technical Information regarding the 1972 Ford Pumper:

Chassis: Ford C cab

Pump: Hale 2 stage midship (not front mount)

Manufacturer: Maxim

Rating: 1,000 gallon per minute in volume mode. The same pump equipped with five two-and-one-half-inch discharge valves would be able to carry a 1,250 GPM rating; only if it came with six-inch diameter suction inlets and the engine could supply the additional horsepower required.

Maxim built the pumper with four $2\frac{1}{2}$ " discharge valves and five-inch suction inlets. Over the years, we added additional suction and discharge valves. So modified, old 282 was able to pump above its 1,000 GPM factory rating from draft using one 5" diameter suction line and two $2\frac{1}{2}$ " diameter suction lines.

I thank Louise for a fine article.
