Our 7th (!) Farmers Market began June 13. There's a new arrangement for the vendors which seems to be working well. We had many people stop and look at the display and take the free post cards we gave out. I'm sure we will have a display at the Fair in 2015.

Aug. 9 was the 5th Annual Caboose Open House and Car Show. Once again, Mother Nature blessed us with a beautiful day. Starting at 10 a.m. proved to work out just fine. Karyn Zanetti, Town of Greenfield's rec. director, took about 100 pictures of visitors on the caboose. These pictures are free keepsakes and truly enjoyed by all. No matter how hot it is, Karyn stays right in the sun, no problem. Stan Weeks, Ed Woodard and Tony Bucca provided the tours of the station and caboose. It's great to see how many young people are interested in trains. Even a toddler running around the train was making the Whooo! Whooo! sound of a train. All the kids held on tight to the free train cars and tracks we offered. The kids loved the Mardi-Gras beads, buttons/pins with the trains on them, and of course, free ice cream coupons, thanks to Stewarts. The bake sale was a big hit, with everything from breads, cookies, brownies, cupcakes, gluten-free items, pickles and jellies. The bakers were Dan Chertok, Joan Rowland, Jane Potter, Katie Finnegan, Rosie and Dominique Rowland, Nancy Homiak, Alice Feulner and Lelah Cornell. HISTORIAN'S CORNER by Ron Feulner

Where did the summer go? When my 98 year-old mother was still alive, she often told me that each year appeared to go faster than the one before. I think that I am now beginning to experience the same phenomena.

The historical society had a busy summer with the farmer's market, the museum, and of course the Caboose Day which was an outstanding success.

Here at the historian's office, we have also had a busy summer. The volunteers and I have been working on a whole host of projects including converting our old VHS tapes to DVDs, creating a data base of names listed in our collection of old one-room school registers, and of course the on-going organization of our extensive collection of photos. All of this between trying to satisfy the many requests for information from residents looking for information concerning their ancestors in Greenfield and other visitors who often stop in looking for information.

One project that we could use your help on involves trying to find the old names of some of our Greenfield roads. Some of the old census reports list families living on a particular road in the Town of Greenfield that we have never heard of. This makes it difficult for someone trying to figure out where their ancestor lived. A recent example involved a reference to "Hayes Road." None of us knew where it was. By chance, I asked Earl Jones, and he said that he was pretty sure that it was the road that we now call "Canty Road." The same census refers to "Haggerty Hill Road," which we think is now "South Greenfield Road," but you can see where the confusion comes from. If you know the old name of any of our roads, I would appreciate your sharing them with us. You can email me here at the office at thistorian@nycap.rr.com or call and leave a message at 518-893-7432, ext. 315 (since we are only in the office on Wednesdays).

A similar problem is one we have with old addresses. Instead of giving a road or street, many of the older addresses were listed as RD3, etc. (for their Rural Delivery Route numbers), and we no longer have any maps showing where this might be. There must be old post office maps for each of the post offices in the town, but I don't have any here, and it would be a great help if we did. If you have such a map or can share information with us, it would help.

The museum at the IOOF hall is mostly finished (just a few last minute touches needed), so we are planning an open house on Sunday, September 28 from 1-3 p.m. for all of you who have played a role in making the museum a reality. If you donated money, artifacts, labor, or anything else to our project, we would like to have you and your guest(s) join us on that date for a tour of the museum. We do not plan to open to the general public until next spring (after the heating season ends) so please join us on the 28th for a sneak peak.

On September 16, I am scheduled to be the presenter at the September meeting of the historical society, and hope to see you all there.
