START OF A NEW YEAR

Here we are again at the beginning of a New Year, looking forward to all of the new and wonderful things a New Year can bring. As we look forward, we often look back to reflect on the past and how far we have come and project where we are going. With the resignation of Louise Okoniewski as president, as vice president I have become the interim president of the Historical Society. Thinking back, I remember many years ago when I was first elected to the board and later as president. How far we have come since then.

We have a Charter. In what seemed like the longest process ever developed in the State of New York, after more than twenty years of starts, stops and delays the Society was awarded its Charter from the State Department of Education. We have Not-For-Profit status. Once the Charter was issued, we were able to apply for and receive our Not-For-Profit status with all of the benefits and ongoing paperwork that provides.

The Historical Society has been able to make renovations to the Odd Fellows Hall in Middle Grove and create a beautiful meeting space and a Museum. The Daketown School House is scheduled for new paint and minor repairs, while I remember just repairing the windows and trying to determine how to remove what was installed when it was used as a camp. We have been able to sponsor the Farmer's Market in the Town of Greenfield, starting before they became as popular as they are currently. The Caboose Days, started to highlight the work of dedicated people in the Town to renovate the Caboose at Kings Station, has become one of our most successful and anticipated annual events. The annual Christmas celebration has become another favorite of everyone as a way to connect with members at the Holiday. Having celebrated the Society's thirty years, our now annual Gala is becoming a wonderful social and fundraising event.

We have changed a great deal since I was last the president of the Historical Society. With these changes have come additional responsibilities. Our budget in

year's past was only a couple hundred dollars to meet postage and the small electric bills we had. Our annual budget is now over \$10,000 to provide heat, lights and security in our Museum as well as expenses for displays, maintenance and upgrades to our facilities and conservation of the collection. Recently, I met with Abby Zoldowski of A to Z Textile Conservation, to document the Society's textiles and review conservation and storage. She was very impressed with the scope and scale of all of the items we had in our collection. As we spoke she described working on similar items for a display at the American Folk Art Museum in New York, 'Mystery and Benevolence: Masonic and Odd Fellows Folk Art,' with some items in better condition.

All of the members of the Society have worked hard to achieve all of this progress. Everyone has been able to work towards these goals in whatever manner they have been able to do. No contribution, to make the Society the best possible, is ever too small and everyone should be proud of all of the accomplishments we have been able to make. The Town of Greenfield has been extremely supportive of the Society, providing permission to use municipal property in our endeavors and providing financial support, both of which have been greatly appreciated. The Society has also been fortunate to have had several very generous supporters of our efforts making much of our progress possible.

As we move into this New Year, I look forward to serving out the last several months of Louise's term and hope that I will be able to continue the amazing work that she and all of the past presidents have been able to complete to make the Historical Society the vibrant organization it is today. I hope this New Year brings good health and happiness to all of the Society's members and the Society is able to move forward with more great projects to help preserve all of the years past in the Town of Greenfield.
