This event began as a way to show the restoration of the Caboose at King's Station after an accident damaged the end of the caboose facing Route 9N. Almost all of the original committee is still involved in this annual event. Stan Weeks along with Serge Roy and Ed Woodard "dressed" the caboose in a new coat of red paint. Stan painstakingly took the time to remove and paint the yellow railings, black trim and white lettering. The roof needed some repair work which he also addressed. By Aug. 12,

the caboose was impressive as it stood on the rail next to the station house. All the visitors really enjoyed the caboose tour, especially the rest room.

Stan Weeks and Tony Bucca (our train engineer) educated our visitors about the life of a railroad worker and how the caboose was used. HISTORIAN'S CORNER by Ron Feulner

The end of a busy summer is upon us. The historical society has been actively involved all summer. The farmer's market has remained strong with dedicated vendors and their steady flow of consumers. The Caboose Day was another outstanding success and seems to get better every year, and the museum with its team of volunteers has steadily grown in terms of visitors. Joyce Woodard covered Friday evenings and Bernice Bencze along with Karen Rhodes did most of the Saturday afternoons. Patty Schwartzbeck and Jane Potter filled in as a substitute on several occasions. Without these volunteers, the museum could not be enjoyed by the public as it is now.

Here in the historian's office, we have managed to stay busy also. My strong team of volunteers, Joyce Woodard, Ruth Ann Assman, Marie Ahl, Mary Vetter, and Joan Rowland are busy with several projects. One of the biggest is our attempt to re-publish Clayton Brown's book, Greenfield Glimpses. The town clerk has been selling copies for many years. Recently, they sold their last copy and asked me how we could get more. Since the original manuscript is missing and no record exists of who the printer was, our only option was to re-do the entire book. In order to do this, I had to cut the pages loose from an existing copy, and one of the volunteers scanned it page by page. Then it had to be processed by a word recognition program and proofread as the recognition program made many errors. Finally, we decided to insert better photographs than the copied ones. It has been a long process and when we are finished it will be in a different format. Instead of the small green book that everyone recognizes, it will now be larger and spiral bound. We hope to finish sometime this year and have it for sale again.

I had the privilege of participating in the county's deceased veterans program this summer when Howard Older of Middle Grove was honored. Howard was killed in action during World War Two. Howard was a member of a large family of Olders,

including his well-known brothers, Lawrence and Elliot who were long-time residents of the area. Howard's two children, Bill and Alice, and their families attended.

One of the more interesting history projects this summer has been the restoration of the Dake Cemetery. The Dake Cemetery like many other small cemeteries in the Town of Greenfield was abandoned in the woods and growing up with underbrush so that it was difficult to find. (Rick Bishop had volunteered a few summers ago to find all these cemeteries and list them and their locations in a book which is now available for sale at the town clerk's office.)

The Dake Cemetery is located on North Creek Road west of the intersection with Sand Hill Road. It is on top of a steep bank near the spring on North Creek Road. (I believe that once it may have been on land owned by the Dake family whose homestead was across the Kayaderosseras Creek on Daketown Road. In earlier days, when this was all farm land, the cemetery was probably visible from the homestead.)

Gary Dake and his father, Bill, and son, Charles, had recently taken an interest in restoring the cemetery. They cleared out the underbrush which had been hiding the existing stones and then hired a restoration team, Minxie Jensvold Fannin and her husband, James C. Fannin Jr. from Concord, Mass.

Minxie and James, along with an employee furnished by Gary Dake, spent several days this summer working on the cemetery. First, they uncovered many of the fallen stones and tried to match them with their bases. If the bases were still intact, they mortared them back in place. When the base was gone or badly damaged, they poured a new concrete base with a piece of rigid board insulation in the center. After the concrete cured, they removed the form, dug the soft insulation out of the center and set the upright stone back in the cavity and mortared it in place.

They had tents set up on the site and worked rain or shine. They also cleaned the stones making them more readable. I understand that the work is not finished, and they plan to return again next summer.
