HISTORIAN'S CORNER by Ron Feulner

As your town historian, I am trying to decide the next step in our ability to serve all of you when you come to us with questions about the history of our town. With the hard work of all my wonderful volunteers, we have created data bases indexing a good share of our extensive collection of information in the town historian's office.

Having information is not of much value if you cannot find what you want when you need it. It's not like my home workshop, which my sons think of as a complete unorganized mess, but what they don't know is that I have a system, but it is all in my head. The fact that they can't find anything doesn't mean that I can't.

Unlike my shop, the amount of information stored in my historian's office is way too extensive for me to keep in my brain. To help in finding information, we have divided it into categories like photos, newspaper scrapbooks, family genealogies, general files, vital statistics, etc. My volunteers have taken much of this material and gone through it page by page and created indices or data bases, which we have then entered into computers where we can search for a name or place. When the name comes up on the computer, it also tells us the book number and page number where we can find the original.

We are far enough along with this, after seven years of hard work by a number of dedicated volunteers, so when we answer the public requests that come in weekly, we often can find the information requested in a matter of minutes. Many of our visitors have complemented us saying that we are one of the most organized historian's

offices they have ever visited. But we still have a long way to go. We still have files and boxes of historic papers that have not been sorted and indexed yet.

In addition, I have a growing concern about the safety of the original documents. Many organizations in other parts of the country have lost their entire collections of nonreplicable material to fire, floods, and other destructive events. Our collection is too valuable to take chances with, so I am investigating ways of preserving it digitally. We have looked at several software programs and are leaning toward one, which we hope to have up and operating by the end of the year. We are hopeful that it will allow us to scan in our documents and photos and store the images off-site in case anything ever happened to the originals. We are also hopeful that, at the same time, we can make the information searchable on our computers.

Of course, the ultimate goal would be to someday place our collection online so that all of you could search for information in the comfort of your own homes without coming to or contacting our office, but that is too far down the road for me to estimate when it might happen. My hope is that everything we do works toward that ultimate goal, and we don't waste our time doing something that will be obsolete.

These are big steps for us since we only work in the office one day per week, but I think that it is important that we at least point ourselves in the right direction and have a clear goal to work toward.

I want to close by thanking my volunteers for the many hours and days that they have worked at these projects. I am aware every day how fortunate I am as a historian to have these people past and present help me toward these lofty goals.

Last year's profit was \$7,705.34 but there was a \$5,000 donation. Without that 2016 it would have been \$2,705.34 so we beat that.


