This month's meeting will be busy. In addition to our regular business and our presentation, we will elect officers for the coming year. We will also have a second vote on the constitutional change shown on page 2.

It has been brought to my attention that we have an additional Article in the constitution that needs to be amended to bring it into line with the change to Article V, Section 3. This is Article VI, Section 2. The proposal is as follows:

Article VI, Section 2 of the constitution of the Town of Greenfield Historical Society currently reads as follows: Elections of officers shall take place at the May Annual Meeting. New officers shall assume their responsibilities on June 1st. The Society's fiscal year shall run from January 1st to December 31st. The section will be amended to read as follows: Elections of officers shall take place at the May Annual Meeting. New officers shall assume their responsibilities on June 1. The Society's fiscal year shall run from June 1 to May 31.

This proposal will bring this article and section into agreement with Article V, Section 3.

## HISTORIAN'S CORNER by Ron Feulner

Last month, I wrote about how churches played a major role in the lives of the early settlers. I also wrote about the history of the first church, The First Congregational Church of Greenfield. This month, I shall write about other church histories in the town.

One year after the Congregational church formed in the Town of Greenfield, the First Baptist Church of Greenfield formed in 1791. This church formed when a number of the Stillwater, NY, Baptist Church members moved to the Greenfield area and proceeded to start their own church here. The Stillwater church was a mother church of sorts to this congregation as it would be to others. The First Baptist Church of Greenfield was given the name "Hemlock Brook," and its membership grew rapidly.

In 1816-17, members were able to build their first church building which was described as able to comfortably hold 250 people. An early description of the church building was written by Mrs. L. A. Morehouse and reads as follows, "There were two horse sheds on either end of the main building. When services were being held, both sheds were completely utilized plus hitching posts in the yard. Two large box wood stoves were located on both sides of the main entrance to the church. Long lengths of stovepipe suspended from the ceiling extended the full length of the church to the chimney in the rear. There were stairs leading to the balcony on either side. The high windows on both sides of the church had small panes of glass. Full length inside wooden blinds were used at each window."

The First Baptist Church of Greenfield is still active with their meeting house located on the north side of Wilton Road near Greenfield Town Hall. Today, this church is the oldest continuously running organization in the Town of Greenfield.

Other Baptist churches would follow the First Baptist Church of Greenfield, but I will leave my discussion of them until the next newsletter. VIRGINIA – HAROLD FREEMAN JONES, 83, of Stuarts Draft went to be with the Lord on Sunday, April 21, 2019 at his home. Born Jan. 31, 1936 in Greenfield Center, NY, he was the son of the late Arthur Leroy and Nina Elizabeth (Hathaway) Jones. On July 13, 1957, he married Elizabeth Laidlaw. The two shared a loving and blessed union of 61 years together. Harold was a member and



elder of Faith Baptist Church, Williamsburg. As a church member, he enjoyed helping with the Awana Club and playing an active role in the young men of the church. Prior to retirement, he was employed with Allied Chemical where he worked as a chemical engineer for over 40 years. He was instrumental in the development of integrated circuit chips and served as a liaison between the California and Japan offices. He made numerous work trips to Japan and relished his time spent there learning the Japanese culture. Harold was a member of the American Institute of Chemical Engineers and the Tau Beta Pi Engineering Society.

He will be remembered as a loving husband, father, grandfather, and friend to many. In addition to his parents, he was preceded in death by one grandson, Timothy Jones; and sisters: Neva Thompson, Arlene Butler and Gladys Jones. In addition to his wife, survivors include his children, Ken Jones and wife, Sue of Fishersville, VA, Doug Jones and wife, Sue of Milmay, NJ, and Kathy Neu and husband, Ken of Annville, PA; grandchildren, Chris Jones, Ben Jones, Emily Phillips, Amy Jones, Edward Jones, Zach Neu and Sarah Neu; and sister, Helen Woods of Schuylerville, NY.

A memorial service will be held at 11 a.m. on Saturday, May 18, 2019 at Faith Baptist Church, 4107 Rochambeau Dr., Williamsburg, VA. # What Was The First Vehicle You Ever Drove?

This summer, stop at the Historical Society Booth at the Farmers Market and add your name, what car/truck, make, model, year, if you know. Add your story to the list.

# The question is "What was the first vehicle you ever drove?"

Mine, well – I was 11 – It was 1970, Jim and Ken White were helping my father, Myron Rowland, with the haying. They decided to come up while he was at work, to bale and load the lower field. Their mother, Ella White, came with them. They got my sister, JoAnn, and I to go help. I remember my mom stayed at our house.

The White's tractor was being used to bale the hay, using our baler, which produced small round bales.

Ken decided to teach me to drive his Scout to pull the wagon. Then he could load the bales on the wagon. The 1970 Scout (Jeep) was standard on the floor. I knew how to shift because I had been one of the 4 or 5 in the front bench seat and I shifted when the driver told me to. So here I am, learning standard for the first time, on a vehicle (not the tractor – it is different). To this day, I can not drive a standard. I learned with a load of hay helping me out of first gear and without that load to push me along, I just stall. [In my defense, we have never had a standard car in our family since I could drive legally.]

The other thing that happened that day was, Ella decided we needed our tractor at the field. JoAnn had her permit to drive and since the sheriff had not gone by yet that day (they were on a regular schedule), Ella sent me up to the house with the Scout because I was only 11 years old, didn't have a permit to be taken away, so I was the best choice to go? Anyway, I drove the Scout up to our house; over the two stone bridges, out to the paved road and up to the house. I got our 9N Tractor and drove that back to the field.

I remember mom coming out of the house and asking me what I was doing driving the Scout - I said "because Ella told me to."

So – what is your story? Think about it – we will be at the booth at the Farmers Market every week. The Farmers Market is from June 21 until Sept. 13, from 4 to 7 p.m. every Friday.


I will write another story for the October newsletter with some interesting vehicles. If you have a story, drop it off or tell me.

# Daketown School Mug by Joan E. Rowland



#### Here is a little history of the school at Daketown.

The 1856 Geil Map shows a school on this site, but we don't know when the school was built. In December 1876, the school burns to ground. January 1877, a resolution passed to build a new school.

The photo on the mug was circa 1880. We know that in May 1915, the back window was shifted so the blackboards could be installed. In May 1930, the school was moved back about 10 foot and new sills were installed. In May 1937, the district voted to install electric lights. May 1954, the district was consolidated. June 1956 school closed. Students are to be sent to Porter Corners School. This property becomes a private residence (photos where school is painted red). In 1991, Bill Dake purchased school and donates the schoolhouse to the Town of Greenfield Historical Society. In 2004, Historical Society has school restored to its original condition under the supervision of John Munter and Munter Enterprises. Currently, up keep is in the TOGHS annual budget.

The students on this mug are from left to right: Arthur Deyoe, William Wilsey Jr., Benjamin C. Dake, Harvey Deyoe, Mable Wilsey, Anne Webb and Edith Dake Ellsworth. The teacher is Fanny Pendrick. The current photo was taken June 2018 after the 3rd graders from Greenfield School came for their annual visit.
