WEEZIE'S WORDS

No it can't be! Not another snow storm or heavy cold rain. Those were my thoughts on Tuesday, April 16, for our monthly meeting. Not another cancellation. But Mother Nature cut us a break and we were able to have a wonderful meeting! There was a full house of 30 members that attended to hear Bradford Smith and Ellen Kostroff tell the story of Bradford's family's trip to Florida in the year 1922. Family vacations were unheard of in those days, especially from a Galway farm family. Bradford's parents, Mabel and Platt Smith, decided to take a trip to Miami, Florida, with the family, but it was not as easy as jumping in the car and heading out. There were farm animals that needed to be fed and taken care of, plus other farm chores. One reason that Mabel and Platt Smith wanted to go south was a change of scenery and the thought of a warm climate. Ms. Kostroff showed pictures of the family farm with snow banks as high as the barn roof. So, they decided to make this happen. They found people to take care of the farm and animals. In 1922, they packed supplies (which included food for three months, tents and other camping gear) and headed to Miami in the family's 1920 Willy's Knight. Travel to Florida was a one way rutted road. The only paved roads were near the cities. In 1921, there were 10 million autos on the road. This was the time that the nation was starting to widen it's horizons. Mabel and Platt were part of the new vacationers ... however, travel was not easy! Work was as hard at times on the road as on the farm. There was cooking, cleaning, set the large tents up and take them down. Pack everything up and off again. Not to mention the weather. The travel time took months. If you met another car on the road, one would need to back up or pull over so the other could pass. Should something happen, such as going off the road or a flat tire, another traveler was always willing to help. You just had to wait for them to come along. One of the main chores was trying to keep the children occupied. The families that traveled had the kids set up in schools along the way. Finally the Smith family made it to the Sunshine State! Bradford and Ellen showed pictures of the family along the beaches, playing in the water as we do today. Florida had more paved roads, which made it easier to get around. The

family made many trips to Florida in the following years. They truly enjoyed the trips, and the acquaintances they met along the way. Mabel Smith kept a travel log of their adventures, these were important accounts of those times. You can read more in Bradford Smith's book, from New York to Florida – An American Family's Life on the Road between the World Wars.

Before the program, we had a little trouble getting Ellen's computer and PowerPoint to work. But that gave the members time to mix and mingle, and catch up with each other. The meeting started a little late, but no one seemed to mind as they were having a great time visiting with each other. After the meeting and the program, the members enjoyed the refreshments and camaraderie. It was very enjoyable!

ORMSBEE ROAD

Our neighbors, Lou and Pauline Dutcher, who live in the beautiful home which sits where the pavement ends way atop Ormsbee Road, recently gave me a title “abstract” of their property. My review of the abstract revealed some interesting items.

The abstract starts by referencing the description of the property, contained within three separately described parcels, and includes the usual old-fashioned boundary marking system with property lines running “in a straight line, for twenty-two chains and eighty links” to “a stake and stones standing near the creek.”

The first and second parcels reference a prior sale from Jonathan Cole to Rufus R. Cole in 1847. The third parcel was later conveyed from Amasa Martin to Rufus R. Cole by deed dated April 24, 1859. Later on, Irving W. Wiswall, Referee, sold the land to Mary E. Brown in 1900. The land was further conveyed in 1906 to Louis Bowman.

The earliest reference in the abstract is to “Anthony Martin and Susannah, his wife” by virtue of a deed dated 12 April 1833. The people to whom they sold eventually sold to a person who was required as part of the purchase price to:

“deliver at the foot of what is called Cole Hill in said town fifteen (15!) cords of a good fine quality of cord wood including top and body wood as the trees furnish in each and every year so long as the said party of the first part or his wife shall require him to do the same.”

Now, that could be a long running obligation, but the obliged party [of the second part] was probably heartened to know that there was some money involved, to go back to them for their efforts. The party of the first part (or his wife) agreed to pay exactly \$1.50 per cord (!!), as long as the wood shall be delivered by the first day of January in each year.

It is not clear from this abstract when the 15 cord indenture began, but there is proof that in 1868 the debt was considered satisfied, as the release states: “... the covenant for the delivery and sale of cord wood mentioned in last deed is fully paid and satisfied and [here’s to] a consent that the same be discharged of record.”

Later names in the chain of title include Clayton Finch (1890); Wray S. Littlefield (1912); and William P. Moody (1916). It is interesting to note that on some older maps (including the 1954 topographical map I have by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers which shows the “Kayaderoseras Quadrangle”) Ormsbee Road is shown as Moody Hill Road.

Lou Dutcher was not surprised to learn of an earlier Lou who owned his place. He told me that some years ago two sons of Louis Bowman came on a Sunday and stayed for a visit.

There are more stories to tell about Ormsbee Road, and I will endeavor to get them to the newsletter. This former country road might look like a modern day racetrack now, with its broad clear shoulders and wide open views, but its history remains intact. More on this road later.
