

HISTORIAN'S CORNER

In June, a combined effort from my historian's office and the Historical Society hosted about 65 third graders on a field trip to the Historical Society's one room school on Daketown Road, and the museum at the IOOF Hall in Middle Grove. The students along with their teachers, bus drivers, and a number of parent chaperones split their time between the two sites before going to Middle Grove Park for a picnic lunch.

The historical society's president, Mary Vetter, and vicepresident, Joan Rowland, hosted the students at the school, while town historian, Ron Feulner, and deputy historian, Joyce Woodard, hosted them at the IOOF hall museum.

The students had been well prepared for the visit by their teachers, and, as a result, were full of excitement and ready with many excellent questions. It was, I believe, a memorable day for all, and I hope that some of the participants return to the museum this summer with their parents. The museum is open on Friday evenings from 4-6 p.m. and Saturday afternoons from 1-3 p.m. These hours will continue through Friday, Sept. 2.

These hot summer days remind me of my fondest memories of going to the local swimming hole on the Kayaderosseras as a child. Our swimming hole in Middle Grove did not have a name like some of the others (for example, the one near the Sand Hill Road Bridge was called "the Sheep Dip"). Most of us walked to our swimming hole, which was located upstream from the lower bridge in Middle Grove. As I recall, the path went to the left of the house closest to the creek, then we had to cross a barbed wire fence and follow the path parallel with the creek across a pasture, then cross the fence again, and walk through a patch of woods to a point just downstream from where the creek made a wide bend.

The water current was such that it had carved a deeper diving hole on the near bank followed by shallow water and a little sandy beach downstream from the diving hole. Adults had constructed a heavy plank diving board anchored into the bank with a large rock, where you could dive into four or five feet of water. Depending on the time of day, you might be alone or have to share with 8 or 10 people ranging from young to old. Young

men would sometimes stop on their way home from work or come back after supper, and sometimes they brought a bar of soap, since many homes were not well equipped with bathtubs or shower units.

If no girls were around, they sometimes dove in without any clothes on. If they had to change into a bathing suit, they would go back into the woods along a network of intersecting trails littered with small piles of toilet paper and other human trash to change. The girls, as I remember, usually came in their suits.

I learned to swim here. My mother would walk me from our home on Murray Road pushing a walker with my younger brother and sister in it. She would bring a small basket with a towel and an alarm clock. She would set the alarm, because she had to return home in time to start cooking supper. My father worked in the woods all day chopping and sawing pulp-wood and saw logs, and when he returned, he expected supper to be ready.

My mother never went swimming, but would sit on the bank and watch us. One of my scariest memories was almost drowning when a group of teen-aged bullies caught me trying to dog paddle across the creek. They repeatedly pushed me under water, where I remember feeling helpless and seeing bubbles and gulping in water instead of air. Every time I would surface, they would push me under again. As suddenly as the attack started, it ended. I surfaced to see my mother standing next to me in the water. As she towed me up the bank and out of the water, I remember seeing her summer dress and stockings dripping water, and her leather shoes sticking in the sand. I don't know where the teenaged boys disappeared to, but they were gone.

As I got older, my mother let me go alone. When I was about 14, I remember the excitement at the swimming hole when a similar aged girl from New York City showed up one day. She was staying with local relatives for the summer, and she might as well have been from another planet for all the excitement she created.

Our summer fun at the swimming hole lasted until sometime in August, when the adults determined that the creek was starting to "work." This meant that the water was warm and stagnant and ripe for bacterial growth. This was the time when they thought that a swimmer might come down with polio if exposed to the water. This ended our summer swim season.



The Town of Greenfield has two historical museums. One is on the Main drag, for what it's worth, in the hamlet of Middle Grove, one of three main hamlets in the Saratoga County Town of Greenfield.

The other museum is literally just around the corner.

The larger two-storied one on Main Street is full of photo memories, hands on artifacts, the 3-dimensional realities of our shared Greenfield, Saratoga communal history. We even have a chair lift for our elderly neighbors and visitors. Truth be told, it's also for our members. One of our young "whipper-snapper couples" average out at 65 years old. By the way. Pass the word. Come and join us for a night, for a year, as a member or just as a guest on the third Tuesday of the month at the Town Community Center, next to the Town Hall. It always starts at 7 p.m.; lots of good catch up talk with friends. Always a good 30-45 minute slice of Greenfield history, lots of good home made cookies and cakes after the 20-30 minute meeting and a guest historical speaker. You can't lose. Cheapest date around.

You've had a great night and you topped it off with a nice piece of home baked pie or coffee or chocolate or devil's food or banana walnut cake.

The other museum is more subtle in it's approach to presenting Greenfield history.

You don't even know that you are gonna be subliminally programed to love Greenfield history. You'd never guess that is what is going to happen. You just came in to get fed. And fed you will be.
